The Distinction Between YHVH and Yeshua: A Scriptural Analysis Rick Matthews

Introduction

This study explores the scriptural basis for understanding Yeshua as the first of YHVH's creation, emphasizing their distinct roles. - Proverbs 8:22-30 (Wisdom personified): "The LORD possessed me at the beginning of His way."
 - Many see this passage as a poetic description of Yeshua's role, portraying Him as the first created being through whom YHVH executed His creative work.

3. Yeshua's Preexistence Before Creation

Although Yeshua was created, He existed before the physical universe and shared glory with YHVH.

- **John 17:5**: "Glorify Me together with Yourself, with the glory which I had with You before the world was."
 - Yeshua's preexistence affirms His unique relationship with YHVH, but His glory is distinct and derived.
- Micah 5:2: "Whose goings forth are from of old, from everlasting."
 - This prophecy indicates Yeshua's origin in the distant past, consistent with being the first creation.

4. Distinction in Roles and Subordination

Yeshua's role is distinct and subordinate to YHVH, highlighting His dependency and submission.

- John 14:28: "The Father is greater than I."
 - Yeshua acknowledges His subordinate position relative to YHVH.

 - o YHVH is the source; Yeshua is the agent of creation.
- Hebrews 5:7-8: "Though He was a Son, yet He learned obedience by the things which He suffered."

 Yeshua's human experience further demonstrates His role as a servant of YHVH's will.

5. Yeshua's Need for the Holy Spirit and Strength

Yeshua's humanity required reliance on YHVH for strength and guidance.

- Matthew 3:16: "The Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting upon Him."
 - Yeshua received the Holy Spirit to empower His mission as the Messiah.
- Luke 22:42: "Father, if it is Your will, take this cup away from Me."
 - His prayer for strength underscores His dependence on YHVH during His human life.

6. Misunderstood Scriptures That Seem to Contradict Yeshua's Creation

Certain scriptures are often used to argue against Yeshua being created but can be understood in light of His unique role.

- **John 1:1-3**: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."
 - The term "God" (*theos*) here can denote divine nature or authority rather than equality with YHVH.
- Isaiah 9:6: "And His name will be called... Mighty God."
 - The title "Mighty God" reflects Yeshua's role as a divine representative, not as an equal to YHVH.
